**MINUTES**

The twenty-fifth meeting of the Governor's Prevention Advisory Council (GPAC) was convened at 9:30 a.m. on May 8, 2009 at the Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs (ADP). These minutes provide a brief summary of the discussions and decisions made during the Council meeting.

**1. INTRODUCTIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Renée Zito, ADP's Director and Chair of the GPAC, welcomed Council members and guests. She began the meeting by inviting members and attendees to introduce themselves and provide announcements:

- **Jim McLaughlin**, California Highway Patrol (CHP), announced that the Council will be hearing a presentation from Commander Sgobba, of the Santa Barbara area office, who will be discussing a successful DUI program among college age population.
- **Jeff Moore**, Commander of the Drug Demand Reduction Program, California National Guard, shared information about the National Guard's prevention efforts which includes prevention training to non-commissioned officers (NCOs) throughout California. The Community Anti-Drug Coalition of America provided the funds and training for the NCOs to become community anti-drug coalition coaches; about 25% of the team has been trained.
- **Cheryl Grimm**, Dept. of Rehabilitation, introduced herself.
- **Stephanie Weaver**, California National Guard, shared information about the Yellow Ribbon program—a Congressional-supported bill allowing for reintegration training for those coming back from service overseas. There is a plan to provide a six hour science-based prevention education presentation to the returnees.
- **Ray Murillo**, on behalf of Allison Jones, California State University, shared that they are drafting the CSU alcohol policy bi-annual report. He informed the Council that the postponed Alcohol Education Conference will now be held on Oct 26-27, 2009.
- **Paul Oliaro**, California State University Fresno, said that students are creating brief video pod casts with anti-DUI messages that will be used for a summer orientation program.
- **Debbie Wender**, Department of Social Services, announced that the department is currently working on a five year plan to get Title IV funds from the federal government. She will give highlights of the plan at the next meeting.
- **Chris Albrecht**, Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC), introduced Supervising Investigator Jamie Taylor who will be making a presentation on behalf of the Underage Drinking Workgroup. He reported that ABC just completed a two and a half year project for certification and approval of beverage server training programs. There are now 20 programs within the private sector that have received either certification or provisional approval to conduct training for responsible alcohol service throughout state.
- **Beth Hoffman**, California Community Colleges, informed the Council that they are currently "sun-downing" a three year alcohol prevention grant from the local county. Students took the assessment, then built upon the assessment on how alcohol has

affected them or a family member's life. She is hoping the CASBIRT toolkit can be used in all of the community colleges.

- **Richard Lopes**, Attorney General's Office (AG's Office); introduced himself; he had no updates at this time.
- **Michelle Famula**, UC Davis Health, described the conclusion of a five-year environmental intervention project with Pacific Research Center, which included all of the UC systems. She reported that UC Davis had positive outcomes regarding the ability to work with the campus community and the city. This is possibly the beginning of a model program for colleges where they have an opportunity to interact with the community. The findings of the intervention are being published to the community showing the positive results in reducing the harmful affects from alcohol abuse. They are also wrapping up the first year of having an alcohol intervention health educator through monies from a mental health grant. They hope this will be the base for the beginning of screenings and brief interventions on campus so they will have a ready referral resource available for those that screen-out as being higher use individuals.
- **Wendy Tully**, Drug Enforcement Section, CA Emergency Management Agency (CalEMA), told the Council that the main prevention component at CalEMA is requiring an endangered children's protocol for the 58 counties. Their plans for the next three years include a provision for mandatory training to the 58 county task forces to have a better response to these kid's needs.
- **Tom Herman**, Safe and Healthy Kids Program Office, California Department of Education (CDE); oversees Title IV funds and Tobacco Use Prevention Education Funds which go out to the 58 counties.
- **Marlena Uhrik**, California Department of Education, introduced herself and informed the Council of the three GPAC sub-committees of which she is a member.

Director Zito shared with the Council that a request has been received from the California Conservation Corps (CCC) to become a member of GPAC. The Director of the CCC submitted Virginia Clark, Central District Director, as the policy expert and Summer Kincaid as the technical representative. These individuals bring years of experience in the area of youth leadership development, public service, improved employability, and working with counties and providers on Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) issues. Director Zito then asked Council members whether they wanted to accept this membership. All agreed.

## 2. OPENING REMARKS

As discussed in prior meetings, the Department has been looking at ways to help returning veterans. ADP, together with its stakeholders, finalized the Veteran's Awareness Commitment Plan this month. To date, there has been much progress made on many of the plan's objectives. As part of the project, the Veteran's Awareness Initiative Workgroup has developed a Veteran and Service Members web site. Jessica Delgado of the Veteran's Awareness Initiative Workgroup gave a brief overview of the recently unveiled Veteran's web site.

ADP has also been working with California Veteran's Affairs on a bus advertising campaign that assures veterans and service members that we stand ready to help them. These ads will begin in June and will run through the end of August in ten major media markets throughout the state.

Also, as part of the Veteran's Initiative, ADP is hosting four regional trainings on Trauma Informed Care during the week of June 22nd. The training is for all substance abuse professionals, mental health professionals, alcohol and other drug administrators, providers, and policy makers. The training will provide participants an overview of the effects of trauma and trauma informed care and services. It will also highlight best practices on trauma issues impacting clients and veterans. More information regarding these regional trainings is available by contacting Carmen Delgado, with the Veteran's Awareness Initiative, at 322-4840.

Next, Director Zito provided an update on ADP's Prescription Drug Task Force. The draft recommendations mentioned at the last meeting have been revised and were sent to all Task Force members and individuals who had expressed an interest in the Task Force. They were given the opportunity to submit any comments and express their interest in participating in the implementation of any of the recommendations. Their feedback was incorporated into the final document which has been submitted to Director Zito. She will meet with staff to discuss distribution of the report and next steps for implementation of the recommendations. A final draft of the document is provided in members' material folders. Any questions regarding the final draft of the recommendations may be directed to Andrea Howard in Prevention Services at 323-1854.

Director Zito shared that the Task Force has also inspired other efforts to address prescription drug misuse. For example, the U.S. Department of Education's Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drug Issues held two Drive-in Workshops last week to address Prescription Drug Use on Campus. This allowed colleagues to learn more about prescription and over-the-counter drug misuse and potential strategies for addressing the growing concern. ADP plans to distribute an informational flyer regarding prescription drug misuse to all State of California and State University employees along with their paychecks, which would reach 265,000 Californians. In a separate distribution, ADP also plans to have a message printed on the paychecks themselves.

Lastly, Director Zito announced that the 10<sup>th</sup> Annual California Prevention Collaborative Summit was held in March. This yearly summit promotes advances in the prevention of alcohol and other drug issues. The first day was dedicated to youth. The day brought together young people and their adult allies from throughout California to provide and participate in interactive discussions and training opportunities. The second day utilized a caucus format for in-depth discussions on important and emerging issues within the alcohol, tobacco and other drug prevention field. The last day of the summit provided engaging and interactive workshops on various AOD topics. Outcomes and recommendations will be presented to ADP later this month, and outcomes will be shared with the Council at the August meeting.

Next, Michael Cunningham reviewed materials provided to members.

#### 4. COUNCIL PROJECTS

##### Prevention Outcomes

**Michael Cunningham, ADP**

Mr. Cunningham introduced a discussion on the results of the Prevention Outcomes Survey. Mr. Cunningham asked members to look at the two one-page documents in their materials folder. The first one-page document is a copy of the survey which was sent out to all Council members asking for input on the noted measures. The intent of the Council members was to look at agency goals and objectives and determine whether there are any in common. If there are shared focuses of efforts which could possibly lend to sharing of data; then the State Epidemiological Outcomes Workgroup (SEOW) will decide what type of information is tied to specific prevention outcomes. This survey was designed to determine to what extent each member's agency and constituencies are currently collecting information regarding any of these areas, and to what extent members see them as a priority item.

The survey went out to all members, and Mr. Cunningham thanked those who were able to complete it. The second sheet had the data results (bar graphs) of the survey. All agencies who responded said that they are interested in a reduction of substance use and problem behaviors. This says that the Council has the potential for looking across agencies and organizations to see to what extent we are making an impact on certain AOD issues related to use, as well as problem behaviors. Mr. Cunningham opened the floor for comments; none were offered.

Next, Mr. Cunningham introduced Dr. Stephen Bright who made a brief presentation on specific indicators and sources through the SEOW.

Mr. Cunningham said that any members who are not already involved in this workgroup are encouraged to become involved.

Dr. Bright addressed some concerns of the Council members. He explained that he is often asked what are the biggest problems noted from the data—with the result being the cost of excessive alcohol consumption and the importance of reducing it.

Facts about the problem:

- By 11<sup>th</sup> grade, binge drinking is a prominent pattern of alcohol consumption.
- Among high school students, drinking and driving has risen since 2003.
- California adults have higher rates of binge drinking than the U.S. median percentage.
- Binge drinking rates hold steady among adults.
- Over 200,000 DUI arrests occurred in California (time period unknown); most are misdemeanors. Among convicted DUI offenders, 25% have a prior DUI; 151,000 people in 2007/2008 were enrolled in licensed DUI programs.
- The highest rate for misdemeanor DUI and public drunkenness is among the 21-29 age groups.
- Alcohol is the second highest primary drug of abuse for those admitted for treatment based on CalOMS Treatment intake data.

Data that can be obtained:

- Prevalence data about adults and youth (underage drinking, binge drinking, excessive alcohol users, criminal justice involvement)
- Health consequences, injuries, and death
- Sales (to minors, by location)
- Driving drinkers and passengers being driven by driving drinkers
- Risk-prone populations: Co-occurring mental health disorders, college students, women, returning veterans, etc

Mr. Cunningham said that through the work of the SEOW, there will be a statewide profile developed to capture all the EPI data on key measures across the state. The goal is to put together county profiles, or population-specific profiles, and to provide data that is useful for policy development. Another goal of the SEOW Project will be to offer ready access for usable data.

For this reason, Mr. Cunningham recommended all members join this group. He promised that following the meeting, an email will be sent out regarding the SEOW and requests for agencies to identify their data expert.

### **Evidence-Based Programs**

#### **Dr. Christina Borbely, Prevention Specialist, Center for Applied Research Solutions (CARS)**

Dr. Borbely provided an update on evidence-based practices. A conference call was held in February with four agencies who expressed interest in this program to discuss what Phase II of this endeavor would entail. The call included discussion of value and buy-in for a Phase II exploration. The group will be looking at collecting more data on how evidence-based practices are used. The result of the call is a proposal to the Council that a Phase II Evidence-Based Practices Workgroup be convened and information will be gathered from any agency experts on evidence-based practices. These experts will be asked to join this effort and will be used to determine the extent of evidence-based practices being used, how they are used, their effect,

and lessons learned. The goal is to work towards creating cross-agency evidence-based principles.

Mr. Cunningham stated that the objective of this effort is not to use this information to the detriment of any agency; the intent is to take advantage of the Council structure to share information on lessons learned and begin to identify what evidence-based practices have salience across agencies so they can be shared with others that may have interest in implementing them. This is a continuation of broader efforts to share information among and between Council members, especially since a number of agencies are being requested to use only evidence-based practices in their work, yet these agencies do not have a lot of information about the extent of their use, implementation considerations, and outcomes they are creating. This is only as useful a tool as Council members find it to be, and it has to be seen as a value to Council members and something worth investing time and resources into. Mr. Cunningham then asked the Council if they feel entering into Phase II is a worthy effort. If so, would Council members be willing to identify someone in their agency as a point of contact.

Mr. Oliaro replied, "We are all interested in the capacity to make data-driven decisions. If we are going to look at our agencies to determine what is being used, we need a definition of what evidence-based is. We all define it differently, across the board."

Mr. Phillips of CPI responded that this could be part of the process for the group to determine. To know what various definitions exist across sites could be of great interest to the organization, as well.

Dr. Borbeley said the group is not trying to create a common definition. The Phase II exploration would include gathering more information about what the various definitions look like at respective agencies, she explained. Phase I focused on what was available in the public domain; Phase II is looking to expand the information gathered into interviews with a key point person.

Mr. Cunningham then asked whether the Council wants to move forward with this effort. All agreed.

Dr. Borbeley indicated she will follow-up with the individuals she has already talked to and will move forward on scheduling a meeting to discuss next steps. Mr. Cunningham asked what the timeline will be for this effort. Dr. Borbeley responded that they will have to define who wants to participate based on interest level, and then proceed. Mr. Phillips interjected that the designation of an individual to follow up with, for each of the agencies, is critical. The names of these specific individuals should go to Dr. Borbeley directly. A letter will be sent to the Council in this regard. Dr. Borbeley agreed and indicated that they are ready to move forward, but can't without Council's help, so they will be contacting Council members to get more information about persons to contact and definitions. A progress update will be provided at the next meeting and again at the end of the year.

## 5. PRESENTATIONS

### **“Separate the Keys from the Keg-A Collaborative Effort to Reduce DUI-related Injury and Fatal Collisions through Education and Enforcement”**

**Capt. Jeff Sgobba, CHP, and Mr. Gabriel Mann, University of California, Santa Barbara**

Captain Jeff Sgobba, CHP, and Mr. Gabriel Mann, Peer Education Coordinator at UC Santa Barbara and independent contractor in the Sacramento area, presented to the Council on their efforts to reduce DUI-related injuries and fatal collisions through education and enforcement with the “Separate the Keys from the Keg” DUI College Corridor Project.

The presentation began with stories and statistics of drinking and driving casualties. Discussion then moved to talk of the DUI College Corridor project, started in 2004, which is typically a 12-month grant focused on education and enforcement. The grant funding provides for contracts with local police and sheriff departments, ABC, university police departments, and university peer education programs.

The goal of the project is to reduce fatal and injury collisions attributed to 18-24 year old DUI drivers, to reduce the number of victims killed and injured in collisions attributed to this population of DUI drivers, and to improve and/or develop partnerships between law enforcement, college campuses, and the community to address DUI problems.

The presenters went on to discuss the UC Santa Barbara project, specifically, and the outcomes of this effort. The project saw a 14% reduction in the number of injured DUI drivers; a 100% reduction in the number of fatal DUI drivers, a 10% reduction in the number of injured passengers; there was no change in the number of fatalities for passengers. Lasting results included some task forces continuing to meet after the grant period ended and there is continuing cooperation/communication between allied agencies around this important issue.

The presenters then showed a video depicting the program.

Director Zito asked presenters about a group of students that had convinced supervisors to reverse their decision on a social host law. In response, the presenters told of a recurring event where youth congregated on the beach, known as “Flowtopia,” but that the social ordinance had not ceased as a result of this event.

Mr. Joël Phillips of CARS asked whether the part of the plan to increase the number of DUI checkpoints also successfully increased DUI arrests. The presenters responded that it did, and it targeted that age group, specifically, because the checkpoint locations were in and around campus.

Mr. Jim Kooler of the Friday Night Live Partnership asked whether any lessons were learned in the overall grant process. Presenters replied that in terms of community members, it is about getting the best cross-section of people, knowing their ability to bring others in, and connecting that with the campus.

Ms. Famula stated that “you raise an important point around this—cultural competence...we talk about it in terms of ethnicities and where you are from, but this is different when we are talking about college campuses—it is so important to spread this information.”

Then, ABC representative Christian Albrecht commented that he wanted to share with the group how effective the partnership has been between ABC and the project.

## **“The Invisible Epidemic”**

**Kathy Page, Ph.D., FASD Consultant for ADP’s Office of Women’s and Perinatal Services**

Dr. Kathy Page made a presentation to the Council on Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD), including the range and prevalence of FASD, symptoms, associated disorders, disabilities and secondary disabilities resulting from the disorders. She explained that Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders are a wide range of impairments resulting from exposure to alcohol during gestation. These can be physical, medical, intellectual, emotional, sensory, regulatory, relational, or linguistic, and can be present across the full range of intelligence.

Dr. Page went on to discuss the range of severity, prevalence, symptoms, and common issues around FASD. Dr. Page emphasized that intake of alcohol during early gestation, days 19-21, result in this type of damage. The more one drinks during this period, the worse the affect. One dose of alcohol while brain cells are migrating to the cortex causes cells not to adhere, instead they become reabsorbed. Although some cultures say that alcohol use during pregnancy is inconsequential, there is still a potential for loss of brain cells.

One audience member asked—once these symptoms are identified in someone as an issue, what is done? Dr. Page responded that the main thing to do is identify that this is a brain problem, and not to take it personally (like autism).

Director Zito acknowledged that this is a big issue, and more information is needed, suggesting Dr. Page return to present again for the Council.

## **6. COUNCIL WORKGROUPS**

### **High Rate Underage Users Workgroup**

**Tom Herman, California Dept. of Education**

Mr. Herman said that the workgroup is in the process of posting Student Assistance Program (SAP) bulletins on the CDE web site, and will be posting more, shortly. Marlina Uhrik shared that the SAP bulletins provided in members’ materials shows what is on the web site. The workgroup is focusing on “connecting the dots” so people know how much SAPs relate to academic achievement. Every bulletin will remind the reader that the purpose of this effort is to close the achievement gap.

### **Underage Drinking Prevention Workgroup**

**Jaime Taylor, Alcoholic Beverage Control**

Jamie Taylor, new chair of the group, told the Council that the group met in February, at which point goals were developed for the group (see handout in materials packet). They want to connect with other groups like the military, CHP, etc. to share resources and to get the message out on underage drinking. Some goals have already been accomplished. The group added information about Alcopops and alcohol energy drinks to the ABC LEAD program (training for licensees and applicants) to increase awareness in selling these types of beverages. Over 200 Alcopops posters have been distributed to CHP offices, county AOD offices and AOD providers throughout California. The workgroup plans to distribute the posters to DMV offices, EDD field offices, and schools.

New members were invited to join the group and Stephanie Weaver indicated an interest in joining.

**California Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral and Treatment (CASBIRT) Program Subcommittee**  
**Michael Cunningham, ADP**

Mr. Cunningham shared that, as of April, over 70,000 screenings were completed in San Diego. CASBIRT is currently operating at 14 sites in the county. He explained that the project is still continuing and is looking to expand to more sites in San Diego County. In January, the project moved into a community clinic in north San Diego County. Since this is a demonstration grant which has a beginning and an end, one of the main tasks in the final year, is identifying ways to sustain services at the conclusion of the grant period.

At the August meeting, Mr. Cunningham will share an update regarding outcome data and look at changes occurring in the program. One anticipated change is moving into LA County in different settings which include working with short term detainees at LA County and city jails. The program will also offer an incentive if clients agree to be screened for follow-up in six months.

In addition, a briefing paper on screening and brief intervention was developed for Council members to use in marketing this effort. Links on the ADP web page take users to the electronic toolkit. The toolkit is divided into different categories to identify materials, including an overview and a description of use in different settings. The toolkit's contents include an introduction of SBI, supporting research, instructions for conducting brief screening, an audience screening instrument, instructions on how to use, and handouts on the affects of alcohol. The briefing paper (provided in member packets) provides an introduction of the concept to the reader. This is an ongoing project that is being developed with input from the subcommittee; it will be updated and posted to the web site as new materials become available. Mr. Cunningham said that trainings will also be provided.

## **7. OTHER ANNOUNCEMENTS**

### **Request for Approval of Future Presentations** **Director Zito**

Director Zito turned the floor over to Mr. Cunningham, who wanted to request the Council's approval for future presentations. First he proposed to have the California Association for Alcohol and Drug Educators present at the August GPAC meeting. The presentation would address training and educational resources available through the Community Colleges and CSUs that address prevention knowledge and skill building. These courses are the tools needed to meet the growing demand for professionals skilled in drug and alcohol prevention. The courses combine a strong academic foundation with real-world experience in counseling and prevention and focus on science-based addiction education. ADP has been contracting with CAADE for many years to develop and update curriculum guidelines for higher education. The current ADP contract includes the development of two Cal-State baccalaureate programs for Alcohol and Drug Studies.

The Council approved this upcoming presentation.

Next, Mr. Cunningham proposed a presentation for the November meeting on behalf of Mary Strode of the Department of Public Health who is interested in providing a brief presentation on the California Tobacco Control Program's statewide tobacco retailer licensing campaign. This campaign's goal is to reduce illegal sales of tobacco to minors by empowering local tobacco control advocates to work on tobacco retailer licensing policy adoption and implementation campaigns at the local level. The presentation would cover implementation successes and

challenges and future outlook.

The Council approved this upcoming presentation.

Director Zito then asked the audience whether there were any additional announcements.

Richard Lopes, AG's Office, announced that the DOJ just finished a video that he would like to present it at the August meeting. The Council approved.

### **SUMMARY/CLOSING**

Director Zito thanked all members and participants for attending and reminded members the next GPAC meeting is tentatively scheduled for August 14.
